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My work integrates textiles and fragrance to condense time and distance and create an immersive experience to reconnect with nature, nostalgia and the comfort of home.

Through a collection of wall hangings, tapestries and room dividers that stimulates the senses beyond sight with a feeling of familiarity, I play with six different fragrances each bearing a strong connection with my South Indian heritage. By creating a coating for cotton yarn with wax and tree resin, colored with natural pigments and fragranced with essential oils, I have integrated scent into handwoven and embroidered textiles. Fragrances can be interpreted universally or can be customized according to the user. I explore patterns and geometry, incorporating recycled sari silk in jeweled tones, fragrant vetiver root and organza silk naturally dyed in earth hues.

The smell of roses in the flower market close to home, the sandalwood scented talcum powder on my grandmother's dresser, the sweet-smelling jasmine with which we adorn our hair at weddings and the earthy scent of the first monsoon rain hitting the parched summer earth. Each piece unique in technique and color palette reinforces my connection with nature and the intimate memory triggered by scent.

At dawn I unite with the breeze To announce the coming of light; At eventide I join the birds In bidding the light farewell.

As I embrace Slumber the eyes of Night watch over me, and as I Awaken I stare at the sun, which is The only eye of the day.

I drink dew for wine, and hearken to The voices of the birds, and dance To the rhythmic swaying of the grass.

The ubiquitous nature of textiles and its applications is constantly progressing and evolving. Can textiles today also help with well-being? Can it interact with all our senses?

Many of us in urban environments crave a connection with nature. By interacting with its elements, nature activates feelings of calm and joy. During this unsettling period of being quarantined in our homes due to the outbreak of COVID-19, emotional and mental well-being has become increasingly necessary and important. The sense of smell is a powerful catalyst to trigger memories and comfort. I have developed a system of incorporating fragrance through natural scent coated and dyed yarn in handweaving and embroidery. Reinterpreting the fragrance industry, I use textiles as aroma therapy to condense time and distance and create an immersive experience to reconnect with nature and nostalgia.










I use only natural or biodegradable materials in my production process. I use filtered beeswax as my base as it burns slowly and therefore releases scent at a slower pace than other waxes. I combine the wax with a tree based resin and natural pigments to provide colour. I introduce pure essential oils for fragrance at a temperature below its boiling point that would otherwise cause the scent to dissipate. Cotton yarn is coated and cured in a sealed casing for 24-48 hours.

Wax is a material that retains scent. The scent is not permanent but impermanence is a part of all things natural. After testing, I have found that the scent remains around a month's time if exposed to air and less time when exposed to sunlight. After which, the fragranced oils must be reintroduced on the waxed surface and air dried for it to absorb.



It is one of my favorite scents. I play with transparency, light, distortion and pattern to elevate the delicate, feminine, airy aesthetics of its scent and its memories.







Vetiver | खस

The layered, grounding, woody scent of the first rains hitting the parched summer earth. The roots of vetiver, a perennial bunch grass native to India, releases a complex aroma and a natural cooling effect when activated with water. Bringing Vetiver into urban spaces by taming its wildness through embroidery and weaves and introducing a sense of delicateness, fragility and dimension.



Vetiver is a fragrant perennial bunch grass native to India. It releases a unique scent of wet earth that is intensified when activated with water. The dry root is often used in India as a natural air-conditioner for its cooling and humidifying effects.

Taming the wildness of vetiver root through embroidery and introducing a sense of delicateness, fragility and dimension, while retaining its natural earthiness.

Vetiver root embroidered with pre dyed mercerized cotton with motifs of earth, life fertility and harvest brought by rain to symbolize its fragrance.







Sandalwood | चंदन

Sandalwood smells like a musky, powdery and creamy wood. It brings to mind my grandmother's dressing table and the smell of Mysore sandal soap and talcum powder that fills the air in her room when she steps out of the shower.

Clove | लवँग

The sweet and spicy scent of cloves reminds me of the spice rack in our kitchen at home, the tempering of our curries, the chewing of clove during a toothchache. This fragrance is reminiscent of home and the holidays.









Natural fibers especially protein-based fibers like silk and wool are often prone to moth infestations that can cause damage to precious and expensive fabrics. Scents such as clove, rosemary and lavender are natural pest repellants. Inspired by the ritual of keeping cloves in cupboards to preserve silk saris, scented woven wrappings can be used to help preserve such textiles and keep moths at bay.
